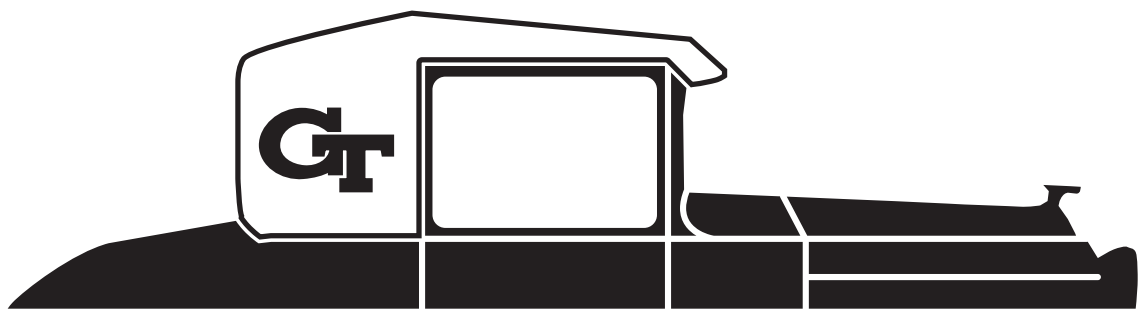

Student Recruiting Etiquette

Please refer to these Do's and Don'ts when representing Georgia Tech:

PLEASE DO:

- Be aware of appropriate opportunities to discuss Georgia Tech with prospective students or parents, but avoid forcing the issue.
- Remember that for the prospective student you are Georgia Tech. So be friendly, professional, positive, and enthusiastic!
- Read your Alumni publications regularly (Alumni Magazine, BUZZwords) to stay up to date on current events.
- Use this handbook and the Georgia Tech Admissions website (www.admission.gatech.edu) as a resource for answering questions.
- Encourage visitation to campus. Visits can be scheduled on-line (www.visits.gatech.edu).
- Be aware of NCAA rules when speaking to student athletes. It is best to allow the coaches to contact athletes.
- Contact the Alumni Association before attending any recruiting event. All recruiting events must be approved by the Alumni Association and the Office of Undergraduate Admission.

PLEASE DON'T:

- Venture to answer questions about which you are uncertain - offer to get an answer and follow-up with the student. It's ok to say "I don't know" as long as you provide a way for the student to have his/her question answered.
- Comment on a student's chance of being admitted. Decision-making is the domain of the professional admissions staff and involves many different criteria.
- Make financial aid evaluations. Circumstances differ, even in cases of similar family income.
- Make comparisons between schools as this does not reflect well on Georgia Tech. Speak of Tech's positive opportunities rather than emphasizing your perceptions of another institution's negative features.
- Use certain phrases that reflect negatively upon the Georgia Tech experience:
 - Please don't refer to "*Getting out*" or someone saying "*Look to your left, Look to your right...*" These phrases do not reflect the supportive environment students experience at Georgia Tech today and are not appropriate in a *recruiting* setting. Please emphasize that the retention rate for freshman at Tech is now 94%, with many graduating in 4 or 5 years.

College Fairs

This is one of the areas where you, our volunteers, are so important to the recruiting and admissions process! A college fair is an event organized and sponsored by one or more high schools, a school district, or a professional education association. College Fairs are programs designed to introduce students to many different college opportunities. Students and parents browse from table to table, ask questions, and pick up literature. This may be the first opportunity for prospective students and their parents to receive information about Georgia Tech.

College Fair Steps to Success:

Please contact the Alumni Association and follow these steps to represent Georgia Tech at a college Fair in your area:

Step 1: Sign up for College Fairs.

A list of college fairs throughout the country is updated often and posted on the GTAAP website at www.gtalumni.org/studentrecruiting. If you see a fair in your area and would like to participate, please sign up using the on-line College Fair Volunteer Form.

Please sign up at least *three weeks in advance* of the fair you plan to attend. The Alumni Association will register for the fair and send you a box of information and materials at least one week prior.

In some cases, you may receive an invitation directly from a high school or college fair. Please contact the Alumni Association before responding to the fair. We must coordinate all visits with the Office of Undergraduate Admission, so please do not attend any recruiting event without first contacting the Alumni Association.

Step 2: Review your college fair materials before the fair.

You will feel more comfortable answering questions if you review the materials and some of the helpful websites in this handbook before arriving at the fair.

You will receive the following materials in your box: nametags, tablecloth, GT table runner, pens, GT pennant, GT table topper, and the following admissions information:

- **Road Piece** -Small booklet. Provides a good overview of academic and student life at Georgia Tech.
- **“Quick Facts”**- Tri-fold Brochure. Provides good, basic information all in one place. You may want to save these to distribute if you run out of Road Pieces.
- **President’s Scholarship Information** - Larger booklet. Distribute to interested students.
- **Information on individual colleges and programs**
- **Viewbook** - You will receive one copy of the Viewbook to display for students and to help answer detailed questions.

Step 3: Arrive early and set up your table.

Please arrive 30 minutes prior to the start of the program.

To set up your table, place the black tablecloth down first. Center the table runner/banner with the Institute logo, so that the logo is displayed in the front center of the table. Place the table topper and pennant on the table as well.

Please make sure the materials are easily accessible to students, but please do not put all of the road pieces and other materials on the table at once. Simply display a few brochures and replenish as needed. Quantities are limited and this will help to conserve the materials.

A note on College Fair Materials: Georgia Tech has a very tight budget for the printing of materials. We do our best to make them last throughout the year. Please do your best to conserve the materials, reserving them for students with potential interest in Georgia Tech. If you have materials left over after the fair, please save them for another event, or return them to the Alumni Association. We will be happy to provide you with our FedEx number to ship them back. Thank you for your help!

Step 4: Answer student questions and distribute literature.

Most questions pertain to programs of study, admissions criteria, cost, scholarships, financial aid, and campus life. This handbook is designed to help you answer those questions. The Road Piece, which you will distribute at your table, also contains information on many of these topics, along with helpful Georgia Tech websites.

Please encourage students to add themselves to the Admissions mailing list. The mailing list website can be found on the back page of the Road Piece:

www.admission.gatech.edu/gtinfo.

This is the fastest, most efficient way for the student to get more information about Georgia Tech!

Step 5: Evaluate the fair.

After each fair, please fill out the College Fair Evaluation form on-line at www.gtalumni.org/studentrecruiting or on the form provided in your box. This step is extremely helpful to the Alumni Association and the Office of Undergraduate Admission as we evaluate each fair for quantity and quality of students and decide on future participation.

College Fair Etiquette:

The National Association for College Admissions Counseling (NACAC) has developed best practices for the ethical recruitment of students. A copy of these guidelines will be provided in your college fair box and can be found on-line at www.nacacnet.org. Listed below are some College Fair Do's and Don'ts based on NACAC guidelines.

PLEASE DO:

- Be honest and straightforward in answering questions. If you do not know the answer to a question, refer the student to the Road Piece or the Admissions website: www.admission.gatech.edu.
- Arrive on time and stay until the end of the fair. Please check in with the college fair coordinator upon arrival.
- Maintain a professional appearance: Business casual is the typical dress. A GT logo shirt is appropriate.
- Distribute only informational materials about Georgia Tech.
- Stay behind the table while talking with attendees.
- Be courteous to attendees and other exhibitors.
- Refer all questions about GT Athletic programs to the Athletic Association (404.894.5400).
- If you find that you are unable to attend at the last minute, please contact the Alumni Association as soon as possible.

PLEASE DON'T:

- Comment on a student's chance of being admitted. Instead, please assure students that each completed application will receive a thorough review.
- Wear jeans, athletic attire, hats or costumes.
- Speak negatively about another school or about Georgia Tech.
- Step out in front of the table or leave your booth unattended.
- Distribute candy, pens, bags, pennants or other promotional items.
- Use excessive audiovisual displays or attention getting devices.
- Send an untrained representative to the fair if you are unable to attend. Instead, please contact the Alumni Association for a replacement.

Admitted Student Receptions

Each year the Admissions Office and the Alumni Association invite prospective students and their families to special programs held near the students' homes. The events are designed to enhance the student's interest in Georgia Tech and to introduce these prospects to the local Tech community. In addition to the prospective students, local area alumni are invited. An Admissions Officer may attend in certain areas.

These receptions, commonly called "Decision Programs" are held prior to the national college decision deadline of May 1. This is often the the final recruiting effort in communities across the country and is an opportunity to reach out to students who have not yet decided which college they will attend. Local alumni are able to offer a valuable perspective to accepted students and their parents.

The Office of Undergraduate Admission targets certain areas each year and will approach the local GTAAP volunteers and/or the local Alumni Club for assistance in hosting or attending the event. Locations are selected based on such factors as historic response, perceived interest and budget.

Admitted Student/Parent Phone Calls

In the spring, prior to the May 1 deposit deadline, GTAAP participants may be asked to make congratulatory phone calls to accepted students in their local area. The purpose of the phone call is to welcome them Georgia Tech and to answer any last minute questions the student may have. Upon being asked to make phone calls, GTAAP participants will be provided with a list of students' contact information and important talking points.

Identifying and Referring Students

As the eyes and ears of the Admissions Office, you are in a unique position to identify potential Yellow Jackets from your community. They might be the sons or daughters of co-workers or family friends. They might be the young women or men that you coached in Little League or taught in Sunday School a few years ago. They might be the students you know whose names were just in the newspaper for making honor roll, for getting a sports award, or for being involved in a community service project. Whatever your source, if you think they would make a positive addition to Georgia Tech, please let us know!

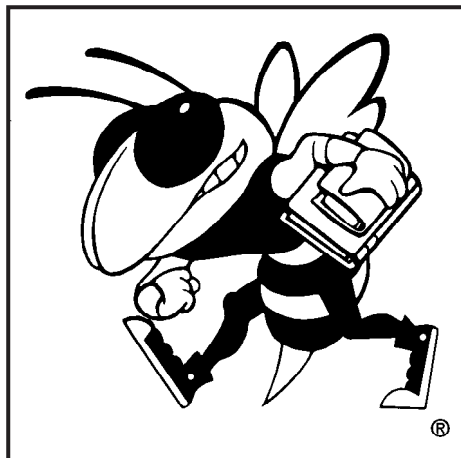

Key Talking Points

As you meet with prospective students and parents during your recruiting activities, we would like you to emphasize two key talking points.

This is the fastest and best way for them to receive information about Georgia Tech!

2) Visit Campus: Please encourage students and parents to visit the Georgia Tech campus. This is the best way for them to see and experience the wonderful academic programs and cutting edge facilities that Georgia Tech has to offer, along with a campus full of green space in the heart of midtown Atlanta! Freshman Admission Deadlines

October 1 - Early Notification Deadline

Students submitting their application by this date will receive a decision notification by mid-November.

November 1- Deadline for President's Scholarship Program Consideration

Students interested in the President's Scholarship must apply by this date. *Decision notifications sent in mid-March.*

January 15 - Georgia Tech Freshman Application Deadline

Students who wish to gain admission for Fall 2010 must apply by this date. *Decision notifications sent in mid-March.*

March 1 - Financial Aid Application Deadline

Students who wish to be considered for Financial Aid must submit the FAFSA and Georgia Tech Application for Financial Aid.

April 1 - Financial Aid Notification

Students who apply for Financial Aid will be notified of their awards.

May 1 - Admission and Housing Deposit Deadline

Students must pay the deposit to reserve their space in the freshman class.

Admissions FAQ's

Students may also call and speak with an Admissions Counselor at 404.894.4154.

• What does Georgia Tech look for in students?

Georgia Tech evaluates four primary components of an applicant's background, in order to make an admission decision. Those four areas are: 1. GPA/Rigor of Curriculum, 2. SAT/ACT scores, 3. Leadership and Activity Record (extra-curricular involvement) and 4. Personal Essay. These criteria are all critical to being competitive for admission to Georgia Tech. Please visit www.admission.gatech.edu/freshman for more information on our review process.

• Is there a minimum GPA or SAT/ACT score required for Admission?

Georgia Tech does not set a minimum GPA or SAT/ACT score to be considered for admission. Competitive ranges are listed below (middle 50%):

GPA 3.74-3.99
SAT 1900-2100
ACT 28-32

• What is the cost of attending Georgia Tech?

The figures listed below are unofficial estimates. The amount of Georgia Tech's Tuition is set by the Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia.

Per year estimate including tuition, miscellaneous fees, books and supplies, room and board and personal expenses:

Georgia Resident: \$18,330

Non-Georgia Resident: \$36,540

These figures do not take the Hope Scholarship or other financial aid into consideration.

Admissions FAQ's

• How do I apply for Financial Aid?

Freshman applicants should submit the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) form to the federal processor and the Georgia Tech Application for Scholarships and Financial Aid by **March 1**. To be considered for financial aid, both of these forms must be submitted on time (even if the student has not yet been accepted).

Please note: It is very important that you do not attempt to make any assessment of a student's potential for financial aid! Please direct all questions to the Office of Student Scholarships and Financial Aid at 404-894-4160 or www.finaid.gatech.edu.

If your local alumni club offers a scholarship, please promote the scholarship and let students know how to apply.

• What is the President's Scholarship Program?

This is the premier merit-based scholarship from Georgia Tech. The President's Scholars Program seeks outstanding students who excel in academics and leadership. The scholarship is offered at several levels up to the full cost of attendance, including out-of-state tuition, room, board, and fees. The scholarship is renewable for a total of four academic years. Other benefits include early registration for housing, study abroad stipends, and special trips designed to enhance students' experience at Georgia Tech.

There is no separate application for the President's Scholarship. Candidates will be selected by evaluation of the applications for freshman admission postmarked by **November 1**. Students selected for the semifinal round will be notified by December 15 and will be asked to submit further evaluations. Finalists will participate in a final interview on campus in the spring. • Are there Co-Op or Internship Opportunities at Georgia Tech?

More than 3,000 Georgia Tech students currently participate in the Co-Op and Internship Programs, all of which are voluntary. Co-op students and interns are employed by more than 1,000 businesses and organizations, worldwide – ranging from small privately owned enterprises to major multi-national corporations and governmental agencies.

**This is an excellent way for students to help finance their Georgia Tech Education. Students do not pay tuition during Co-Op or Internships and will be paid for their work.

• Can I participate in research as an undergraduate at Georgia Tech?

Undergraduate participation in research is a priority at Georgia Tech. The Undergraduate Research Opportunities Program (UROP) is designed to facilitate and encourage opportunities for undergraduate students to participate in research during their tenure at Georgia Tech. Admissions FAQ's

- **Are Advanced Placement or International Baccalaureate test scores considered in the admission process?**

AP and IB test scores are not considered in the Admission process, however designated scores for Advanced Placement and International Baccalaureate exams may count for course credit at Georgia Tech.

Enrollment in AP or IB courses is a factor in the admissions process, when considering rigor of curriculum.

- **What is orientation like? What is the Freshman Experience?**

FASET Orientation is a Georgia Tech tradition since 1972. An orientation program for new students, the program is offered at the start of each semester. During orientation new students will receive academic advisement and register for their courses. New students and their guests will hear from various campus services, student organizations, and Georgia Tech administrators on a variety of social, business and academic components. www.faset.gatech.edu.

The Freshman Experience is a voluntary living option to help freshman get started on the right path at Georgia Tech. Freshman experience students live, eat, and learn together. They are provided with peer leaders, faculty advisors, leadership opportunities, and tutoring. For more information go to the Freshman Experience website: www.freshmanexperience.gatech.edu.

- **What kind of extracurricular activities are available?**

Georgia Tech offers nearly 400 student organizations, including, but not limited to athletic, civic, social, cultural and religious organizations. There are opportunities for students to start new organizations, as well. Go to the Student Activities website, www.cyberbuzz.gatech.edu, to search for opportunities.

- **Does Georgia Tech offer pre-professional programs?**

Georgia Tech offers pre-professional advisement to assist students interested in further study in medical, dental, pharmacy, veterinary, and law schools or a career in teaching. Georgia Tech's approach provides students with an individual program to suit their needs.

- **Does Georgia Tech offer Study Abroad programs?**

Georgia Tech encourages its students to study abroad. Programs are available in more than 25 countries and offer a variety of coursework, with at least one program option for each major. For more information visit the Office of International Education's website www.oie.gatech.edu/sa.

- **Does Georgia Tech have an Honors Program? How can I apply?**

This will be the fourth year of the Georgia Tech Honors Program, which has been a great success.
